Comedy, circus and theatre make *NoFit State Circus* one of Britain's most exciting and original performing companies today. They are breaking down the barriers between art and popular entertainment, creating their own unique and accessible form of theatre.

Established in 1985 *Nofit State Circus* combines a broad range of circus skills with a strong plot and live music to create a show just as suitable for adults as for children. A non-animal circus-theatre company with a totally original style.

But what is circus-theatre? It is physical theatre taken to its limits. By

NoFit State Circus "the finest exponents of British circus theatre" The British Alternative Theatre Directory 93-94 its very nature it incorporates drama, mime, dance, comedy

and circus skills. The result is a unique style that is both humorous and moving, breathtaking and thought provoking.

Each year the company tour a different production. These draw on both popular culture and classical drama to discuss topical issues in an exciting and dramatic fashion. 1994's show "Totally Wicked", based on the Faust legend, is a modern story of the price man must pay for selling his soul to the devil.

Their 1995 spectacular show, another adaptation of a well-known tale, is already being devised. *NoFit State Circus* will once again be attempting to make sense of the madness surrounding us.

Touring from May to September in their own colourful Big Top the Circus performs up to 2 shows a day of their 90 minute circus-theatre spectacular.

Functioning as a non-profit making partnership the company has grown from small beginnings. But sponsorship from ASW Holdings plc and financial assistance from Cardiff City Council, as well as recognition of the company's work by the Welsh Arts Council helped establish *NoFit State Circus* as Britain's leading New Circus.





Kate E: I got into costuming as I have been performing for 8 years in circus and children's theatre and someone had to make the costumes. I'd studied a bit of technique at art school the rest I've learnt as I have gone along. It is enjoyable to see a character developing out of two dimensional materials and with the variety to choose from its like making dreams come true.

Mark Morreau: Treading the same path as John Major but in the opposite direction- Mark abandoned accountancy for the Circus. Having trained at Fooltime Mark worked at Snapdragon Circus. on several Circus productions and with Zippo's Circus. Before joining NoFit State this year Mark's performing heights have been with Juliette Hardy as the aerial duo "Suspended Animation". Mark is the second oldest and third baldest member of NoFit State

Pete Lamb: (Pilo Vulgaris) Indigenous, occasional migrant. Easily recognisable by the lack of cranial plumage. Habitats include trucks, cradle and more recently trapeze. Often to be found inverted but regularly assumes upright position for food. Diet includes stakes, nuts, bolts and crosswords. Courtship rituals includes flamboyant strutting and preening. Can be tamed if caught but does not make good house pet...

Tina Clay: Art school was no good and playing sax for a rock band grew dull. Digging bones was fun- but it wasn't a life. I never wanted to be a trapeze artist-didn't give it a second thought "till the circus came to town" - then BANG- I was sky hooked. Nothing will get me down from here now. Modesty forbids me from telling you too much about my illustrious past apart from the bits in war zones in Nicaragua, a torrid affair with the star of the Cuban State Circus and my physiotherapy qualification. I even thought up the Dream Boys sequence!

Chris Hills: Stupid, reckless, tattered and torn. Aerialist, musician and technician. Left the rigors of circus life after 14 years on the road to start a family but after 14 months has once again come under the wing of NoFit State to exercise his skills and skive the duties of fatherhood.

Jamie Garvin: Jamie has never directed a circus before and has only managed to do it by convincing NoFit State that he's done a lot of work in theatres but isn't a luvvy. Angela Evans: Since leaving the Welsh College of Music and Drama Angela has been surviving as a freelance designer working in many diverse fields. 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
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A HISTORY OF THE STATE (part 1)

Many years ago I read a poster advertising juggling workshops at the local students' union and decided to give it a try (anything was better than studying). I found a like-minded bunch of people and was soon smitten. For the next couple of years you couldn't even have a cup of tea without a bean bag dropping in.

Being impoverished students we soon hit upon the idea of busking; so with no real idea of what it entailed, we painted our faces, went down the town centre and juggled. Three hours later we were only 17p the richer and went home despondent

Undeterred, about 25 of us formed Balls Up Jugglers (no relation to the group with that name now) and got some routines together. We touted our show for free to local day centers, youth clubs, Live Aid, Children in Need, Rag Week etc. Oh the joy of fire blowing off the back of a lorry.... only to find the wind is blowing your way! None of us had had any proper performance training and in some ways this helped as we had no preconceptions or worries about being on stage. There is nothing like actually performing to find out what does and doesn't work. Over the next couple of years Balls Up grew, building its own dome tent, putting on large pantomimes with casts of twenty plus and even starting to get paid work.

In 1985 college was finished and it was time to decide what to do in life. Some people got proper jobs, but five of us decided we liked this performing lark and would try it full time. Thus NoFit State Circus was born and off to the enterprise allowance we went. A winter school and village hall tour followed by a summer of street and festival work saw us through our first year. We were lucky to get involved with Arts Play Umbrella early on and they passed a lot of bookings our way. This relationship developed into a Big Fun marquee tour that saw NoFit State and other companies touring the UK providing summer fun day packages to festivals and local authorities.

1991- time for us to grow, buying our own big top and providing large scale circus theatre productions. That winter we begged, borrowed, hassled and pleaded eventually securing a sponsorship deal with ASW (A Cardiff steel manufacturer). This combined with a large overdraft and other debts gave us enough money to buy a second hand marquee, seating, lights and HGV. Many frantic months were spent on the phone to bookers pleading for work and come summer 1991 we had a four and a half month tour. We came out of this broke but with our debts paid off.

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
A HISTORY OF THE STATE (CONTINUED)

Since then we have operated on similar lines gradually improving equipment, building new seats, trucks, members and most importantly a better show.

Touring a marquee and show is a difficult business, new circus does not get proper funding or recognition, despite being accessible and popular with a wide spectrum of the population. Much of our year is spent administrating, fund raising, building and fixing, often leaving little time to train and rehearse. The cost of putting the tour on the road is astronomical and hard to get back.

There is something special about working and living with a good bunch of people, working on your own ideas and the audience response to a good show. We have a formula that works for young or old wherever we perform and hopefully you'll see us around for a few years yet.
